Spiritual Directing: Listening to the Movement of God with Another SPFM 7503-Three Credits Course #3 of the Certificate in Spiritual Direction

Course Description

The middle year will focus on skill development as a spiritual director. In the classroom, program participants will give and receive direction from each other, developing skills through practice and evaluation by supervisors. Participants will broaden their skills in the practice of peer supervision and self-supervision. The course begins with a required retreat day.

Course Objectives

- 1. Gain experience in giving and receiving spiritual direction through 8 practice sessions.
- 2. Develop further understanding of topics relevant in the field such as ethical conduct, supervision and confidentiality.
- 3. Reflect on one's growing ability to listen deeply with others for the movement of God in their lives through self-supervision and supervisor's assessments.

Course Requirements

- 1. Complete the required reading **before** the intensive begins. Please complete the Canvas form- Required Reading Report.
- 2. Be present and engaged in every session of the week beginning with the retreat on Monday, July 19, through the closing prayer and blessing at 6:00pm on Saturday, July 24.
- 3. It is expected that all directors in training are meeting monthly with a trained spiritual director a minimum of two times during this course. SPFM 7503 course takes place over three months-June 2021 to August 2021.
- 4. The morning of the retreat (Monday at Saint Mary of the Lake) will be a time for personal sharing of your work in SPFM 7502 and your life journey since last summer. Please bring a written reflection to read on *Furthering the Call as Spiritual Directors* (about 5 minutes 650 words max.). As you put your thoughts together keep in mind that you are sharing with your peers, you are sharing from your heart, you are sharing what God has done in life over the last months and you are sharing how your call to be a director is emerging. You may write a poem, read from your journal, bring a meaningful piece of art or music to share with the group as we re-connect and begin our retreat and week together
- 5. Prepare and lead a 10–12-minute prayer time for the entire class based on your work from Practicum I on a topic of Christian Spirituality. In pairs or individually you will lead the class during one of the scheduled prayer times in the week. DO NOT TEACH us about your topic. (For example: the topic of the Enneagram can be used as a prayer practice with its three Centers. Lead us in prayer using the gut, heart and head.) This is to be experiential, prayerful and **brief.** There are 9 prayer times during our course together. See Canvas for more details and the schedule.
- 6. Be prepared for a book discussion with peers on the Barry/Connelly book. Engage and interact personally in your written responses (2 pages, 12 point type) to the following questions:
 - a. How did this book expand your vision of spiritual direction? Be specific.
 - b. What tools did you learn to help a person notice/recognize the Lord? How will these tools help you as a spiritual director?
 - c. "Effective spiritual directors are discovered by the Christian community; they do not put themselves forward without first having others seek their help." What has been your experience of being discovered and sought out by the Christian community? List the qualities the authors suggest for an effective spiritual director. How do these challenge your life?
 - d. What are some key components for a healthy relationship with a directee? What might cause problems or lead to an unhealthy relationship? Chapter 9.
 - e. What image captures the essence of the book for you?

- f. Submit your reflections on Canvas to Janice Kelly before July 18. You will need access to your paper for the book discussion.
- 7. Write a 5-6 page *integrative reflection paper* (double spaced, 12 point type) on the experiences and learning from the intensive. A reflection paper is *not* a summary of your week. Rather it is a way to integrate your learning in a very personal way. By design reflection papers are not research papers. The expectation is that lectures, textbooks, class notes, prayer practices, journal entries, triads, supervisor's notes, self-supervision and peer supervision will be meaningfully engaged and reflected upon. What do you recognize as the Movement of God with Another (course title) as you begin to sit with directees? How has all this impacted your sense of God's call to this ministry? Notice that you are writing WITH God. What do you hear, sense, or feel from the Lord? Weave your story into the material. Feel free to use the pronoun "I". Pray to hear God as you ponder all you have experienced through this class.

Due by August 6 at 5 pm CST. Save your paper as a Word Document please. Save as: lastnamefirstname7503-reflectionpaper. (for example: petersonrob7503-reflection paper). Upload to Canvas.

Grading

Grading is Pass/Fail and is based on participation and completing all course requirements. In order to pass students must complete assignments within the allotted time frame unless they have received prior approval for an extension from the professor. Additionally, if you do not complete this course, you may not continue into the on-line Practicum-SPFM 7504. If you encounter any challenges in completing assignments, please reach out to Rob Peterson as soon as possible.
