COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is held in conjunction with the annual North Park Symposium on the Theological Interpretation of Scripture and deals with the topic of the symposium for that year. Students are required to attend all sessions of the Symposium as well as scheduled class sessions. (from Catalog)

The class will foster concentrated reflection on the papers presented at the Symposium and allow students to participate more meaningfully in the Symposium event. This year's Symposium focuses on creation care. The center of the class will be the two-day seminar (meeting Thursday, September 15, and Friday, September 16). Attendance at all sessions is required and reading of all symposium papers is assumed.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

By the end of the class, students will be able to:

- 1. Articulate major biblical, historical, and theological issues relevant to creation care;
- 2. Engage the theme of creation care in the theological interpretation of Scripture;
- 3. Assess potential implications of the theme for understanding the Christian life and the pastoral practice of the church.

STYLE OF LEARNING

This course is intended to develop your skills as a lifelong learner, equipping you to define issues and formulate projects for yourselves so that you can do this beyond your degree program without the support of a class structure. The role of the instructor is therefore not tightly to define the work you will do for the class but to help you to define that work for yourself. For this reason, you are encouraged to consult the instructor, and it is your responsibility to be in touch and request conversations as necessary. You may contact the instructor and arrange for a conversation prior to the symposium about your choice of books for review if you are uncertain about which books to choose; and you may contact the instructor after the symposium and arrange for a conversation about your research paper proposal.

REQUIRED TEXTS

- Two texts selected for book review (see list below)
- Symposium papers (to be distributed when available)
- Additional sources will be selected for final research paper (approved by instructor)

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ASSESSMENTS

- 1. Participation (10% of course grade). Students must participate in the following ways:
 - Read all Symposium papers in advance
 - Attend the entire Symposium (register <u>here</u>), and ask at least <u>one</u> question in any session
 - Attend and participate in additional class meetings outside schedule paper sessions (Sept 15–16)
- 2. **Written discussion** (20% of course grade). After the Symposium you will engage in two discussion forums. In the first forum, we will discuss questions emerging from paper sessions that we wish to pursue as a class.
- 3. **Book analysis** (30% of course grade). In \sim 2,000 words, compare and contrast two books that address the relationship between the Bible and creation care. You may choose from the list below or, if you like, you may suggest other books. I you choose others, please submit those to the instructor for approval at least a week before the due date.
- 4. **Research paper** (40% of course grade; proposal Oct 30, paper due Dec 4).

ASSESSMENT SUBMISSION

- Submit all work through Canvas as Word files, including your last name in the document title.
- Assessments are due 11:59pm in your timezone on the date listed. Unless you have made an
 arrangement 24 hours prior to the due date, work submitted late will receive a 1/3 grade reduction
 each day (e.g., an A would receive A- after one day, etc.) and may receive less detailed feedback. Work
 will not be accepted over two weeks late.
