### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Participation in global service today for both senders and the sent requires recovering a biblical understanding of God's priorities in the world. It demands facing the painful lessons of historic mission practices and creatively constructing a post-colonial vision for the future. This course is required for those preparing to become Global Personnel (missionaries) with the Evangelical Covenant Church. It is also open to mission mobilizers, lay leaders, pastors, and NPTS students registered for the Intercultural Ministry Certificate (ICM). METE provides a platform for mission mobilizers to interact together around issues relevant for global service with practitioners and potential global personnel. All participants will take the Intercultural Development Inventory (IDI) if they have not done so within the previous two years.

## **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

By the completion of this course, a participant should be able to:

- Identify biblical and cultural evidence of the presence and work of the missio dei
- Appraise historic mission strategies and approaches
- Communicate priorities for practicing post-colonial mission
- Demonstrate understanding of the service pathways of ECC's Serve Globally
- Analyze individual gifting for intercultural service and guide others in that discernment
- Construct a personal plan for intercultural humility and growth

### **COURSE ASSIGNMENTS**

Attendance and participate in each session is required.

Missiology Quiz: METE participants will take a quiz on basic biblical, cultural, and historic understandings of mission twice. The first time will be at the beginning of the course to assess levels of individual knowledge and will not be graded. The second time will be at the end of the course to assess growth in understanding. 15% of course grade.

Online Posting: Each course module will have required materials posted online along with discussion questions and items for comment. Students are asked to post their response online and comment to at least two other classmates each week. Deadlines for posting are listed in the course schedule below. 25% of course grade.

Class Presentation: This course follows the flipped classroom model where the required learning materials for each module are posted online. Participants are asked to review all required learning materials before class and follow the weekly assignments listed. Part of each module will be online posting and part of it will be in preparation for presentations in the live class sessions each Saturday. 25% of course grade.

Final Project: Detailed descriptions of options for final project are available in the online course shell. The objective of this project is to provide an opportunity for participants to demonstrate learning in a venue relevant to their local ministry context. Deadline for posting is listed in the schedule below. 25% of course grade.

Reading Log: A completed reading log (form provided online) will be submitted at the end of the course by the deadline listed in the schedule below. 10% of course grade.
