COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will explore icons as a method of prayer. We will review personal, corporate, historical, intercultural, and current practices using icons. This will be achieved through reading, silence, private meditation, and the exercise of writing (painting) one's own icon. Artistic ability is not a requirement. The instructor will guide students through this spiritual pilgrimage in a group journey that students will then be able to share with others. Enrollment limited to 15.

Note: There will be an additional cost of \$50.00 (beyond tuition and books) for supplies necessary for successful completion of the icon.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

By the end of the class participants will:

- Recognize the historic and intercultural roles of icons in personal and corporate Christian mission and ministry through reading and reflection
- Observe existing imagery used in the students' sacred spaces of worship and ministry and as depicted on social media and websites related to the students' ministry
- Write (paint) an icon participating with God's interaction in life as a spiritual discipline
- Create a means in which the icon may be shared with others or used personally as a vehicle to deepening prayer.

LEARNING ACTIVITIES

- Preparatory Reading/Discussion Students will read and reflect upon the assigned readings as described in Canvas, highlighting the historic and intercultural roles of icons in personal and corporate Christian mission and ministry. Students will write a 750 word analysis following the detailed instructions and grading rubric posted in Canvas. Initial post due online by midnight central time Sunday, September 3. Online response to two others in the class due online by midnight central time Friday, September 8. 25% of the course grade
- Observation Exercise Using the rubric provided in Canvas, students will observe the existing imagery they find in the spaces where they presently worship and what is depicted on the social media and websites related to their worship location and/or ministry. Students will write a 750 word analysis following the detailed instructions and grading rubric posted in Canvas. Initial post due online by midnight central time Sunday, September 10. Online response to two others in the class due online by midnight central time Friday September 15. 25% of the course grade
- Praxis/Prayer Building upon the insights found in the first two learning activities students will spend two days (Sept 12, 9 am to 5 pm and Sept 13, 8 am to 5 pm) together in the classroom writing (painting) an icon participating with God's interaction in life as a spiritual discipline. Praxis sessions will alternate between instructors' directions for both group and individual times for silence and private reflection, and the instructors expounding upon the meaning of each phase of this journey, as well as meaning of gesture, and color. Even though the icon may not be completed by the end of the last session, students will have sufficient time to complete the work by the end of the second day. This activity will be graded upon participation, not on artistic quality. 25% of the course grade
- Creating the Means Following the completion of the icon, create a means in which the icon may be shared with others or used personally as a vehicle to deepening prayer. No longer solely yours, it is now meant to go forth into the world, not as an object unto itself but as a sign and symbol of Christ's abiding presence as a "portal" of prayer. This "means" (choose one) can be crafted as 1) a time of group prayer, 2) a tentative schedule for a personal retreat inviting the use of the icon as a means of prayer, or 3) a gathering conducted for a particular need, such as a service of healing, of liberation, of joy, lament, or comfort. Describe how it invites entrance into the mystery of God. Include personal reflections on the experience in your writing as well as the required



texts and other learning materials. This is to be approximately three pages in length (750 words minimum) and posted on Canvas with a picture of your final icon by midnight central time Friday, October 13, 2023. 25% of the course grade

Spiritual Direction. All NPTS spiritual formation courses require students to arrange a meeting with a spiritual director twice within the semester. Students are responsible for making this connection. To arrange scheduling contact Sue Braun at sbraun@northpark.edu.

Sacred Portals is a Pass/No pass course. A grade of Pass includes student completion of all of the above as well as attendance at each session. No absences in the two days of praxis allowed.
