COURSE DESCRIPTION:

BH 2 is a natural continuation of BH I, which you need to have successfully completed and if you have, congratulations! The main goals of BH 2 are:

- To finish working through the basic Hebrew grammar—which entails the study of the derived verbal stems in both strong and weak verbs (following the Pratico/Van Pelt outline).
- To spend time later in the semester in the Hebrew Bible: working through the book of Ruth.
- To move beyond the basic grammar by working in some more extended Hebrew texts and by reading works in textual criticism and basic OT exegesis.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

BH 2 represents the second semester of study in your Hebrew language and exegesis sequence. The main objectives of the course are:

- To continue developing your core intellectual abilities in Old Testament Hebrew: by taking up careful and serious study of the principal aspects of fundamental Biblical Hebrew grammar—its morphology, phonology, vocabulary, and syntax.
- To continue developing your abilities in critically interacting with, and evaluating, exegetical and theological studies rooted in Biblical Hebrew.
- To continue your growth in your ability to handle the biblical text of the Old Testament with clarity, conviction, and competence—towards the crucial tasks of teaching and preaching Holy Scripture in the church.
- To help you develop spiritually in your ability to study, hear, and meditate on the Old Testament—by bringing you closer to the original Hebrew text.

Learning Hebrew *well* is a great adventure, a worthy challenge, and a central pillar for your fundamental development as a teacher and preacher of Scripture. Be committed to regular, daily study throughout the semester and continue your lifelong journey in learning and using the language of the Old Testament—for the glory of God, for the enrichment of your walk with Him, and for the edification of His church!

CLASS ROUTINE:

First half of the semester (finishing grammar: section 4, derived stems), each week:

- Two grammar chapters to read and study.
- Two sections of vocabulary to study from those two grammar chapters.
- Two workbook exercises to complete from the same two grammar chapters.
- Weekly quizzes (on Canvas)

Second half of the semester:

- Work through the book of Ruth: translation, parsing of verbs, analysis of text-critical notes ("TPN")
- Read the textbooks: Vance, Brotzman & Tully, and Wegner

Note on reading:

• Typically, the reading benchmark for a 3-hour NPTS course is 1000 pages. Since this is a language course, with more intensive our-of-class work/preparation (workbook exercises, textual analysis work, quizzes, and exams), the reading requirement is about half of this benchmark. The above reading (section 4 of the grammar, Vance, Brotzman & Tully, and Wegner) amounts to about 530 pages.

COURSE ASSESSMENTS:

- 1. Homework:
 - a. First half of the semester: students will complete the grammar workbook exercises for chapters 24-35 (derived stems).
 - b. Second half of the semester: students will work through the Hebrew text of the four chapters of the book of Ruth: translation, parsing of all verbs, and study of each text-critical note.
 - c. At the end of the semester, students will post a completed **Homework Log** on Canvas, at the Week 16 module. See Appendix 1 at the end of the syllabus for an example of this log.

2. Reading:

- a. First half of the semester: BBH Grammar, chapters 24-35 (derived stems)
- b. Second half of the semester: Vance, Brotzman & Tully, and Wegner textbooks
- c. At the end of the semester, students will post a completed **Reading Log** on Canvas, at the Week 16 module. See Appendix 2 at the end of this syllabus for an example of this log.

3. Quizzes:

- a. First half of the semester: students will take **6 weekly quizzes**, reviewing the grammar & vocabulary of BBH chapters 24-35 (derived stems).
- b. During the first half of the semester, by Friday 8 am CST of a given week, a quiz will be posted on Canvas (covering the grammar & vocabulary from the 2 chapters covered the previous Tuesday and Thursday). The quiz should be printed, taken "by hand" without helps, scanned as a PDF, and then uploaded to Canvas, by the following Monday, midnight CST.

4. Midterm exam:

- a. **A midterm exam** will be given, which will cover the grammar and vocabulary of BBH chapters 24-35 (derived stems).
- b. The midterm exam will be posted on Canvas, on Friday 3/8, 8 am CST. The exam should be printed, taken "by hand" without helps, scanned as a PDF, and then uploaded to Canvas, by Monday 3/11 midnight CST.

5. Final exam:

- a. **A final exam** will be given, covering sections of the Hebrew text of the book of Ruth.
- b. The final exam will be posted on Canvas, on Monday 5/6, 8 am CST. The exam should be printed, taken "by hand" without helps, scanned as a PDF, and then uploaded to Canvas, by Monday 5/8 midnight CST.
