COURSE DESCRIPTION

This pastoral care and counseling course will create space for thoughtful discussion and practice around the charged topics of sex, sexuality, and sexual violence specific to contemporary congregational contexts. It will emphasize the development of skills and attitudes necessary for having effective and theologically coherent conversations among individuals who may have varying perspectives. In essence, this intensive will be a microcosm of sorts to dialogue and to work through this anxiety-provoking topic in order to engage in healthier and more grounded conversations in wider contexts that reflects God's care. Thus, developing listening and empathic skills for individuals and communities will be integral to this course. Intercultural and ethical perspectives will be explored by using theological and psychological content.Pedagogical methods: readings, lecture, case studies, documentaries, group discussions, and role play. This courses meets the Ministry Field elective.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. Students will identify and delineate basic listening and empathy skills to engage difficult conversations.
- 2. Students will distill theological and social science texts to augment ministerial/pastoral care skills when engaging this topic.
- 3. Students will evaluate fundamental psychological and developmental theories and how they contribute to providing pastoral care.
- 4. Students will demonstrate how intercultural and ethical issues impact sex, sexuality, and sexual violence.
- 5. Students will develop methods for facilitiating dialogue around human sexuality.

Journaling Exercise

Given the sensitive and at times triggering nature of this topic, journaling provides space for students to reflect on the material, lectures, conversations, etc. Instructor will not read the journal entries but student must show evidence that they have completed this exercise by sending a screen shot of the assignment to instructor. Here are questions to reflect on:

- 1) What's came up for me today?
- 2) How did my body feel today? Where did my body feel at ease? Where did my body become tense?
- 3) Where did I lean in conversation? Where did I listen well and was able to hold what others shared even when I disagreed?
- 4) Where did I resist?
- 5) What was triggering?
- 6) What might be God's invitation for me today?

4. **DUE Week of Intensive**

Roundtable 20%

Students will prepare a brief presentation (15-20 minutes) on a topic that they would like to engage pastorally in their context. Feedback from colleagues will be integral part of this assignment. Community Conversation 20%

7-10 pages, double space, 12 Times Romans Font

Students will interview 3 individuals(pastor, fellow colleague, and lay leader/friend) on any of the above topics that they would like addressed in their community. These conversations provide an opportunity for student to reflect on the needs of their community and prayerfully consider how to address them. Please summarize and synthesize what you learn from your interviewees. Here are questions to include:

- 1) Why did you choose this particular topic to address with these individuals?
- 2) What are you noticing in your community regarding this topic?
- 3) What are the common threads and themes from this interview?
- 4) What readingsfrom required or additional resources) might be helpful to address some of these common threads and themes?
- 5) What was this process like for you? What did you learn about yourself? Your colleagues as you discussed this topic?
- 6) What might be God's invitation to you and to your community regarding this topic?

2. Due August 3rd by 11:59pm Final Project 30%

7-10 pages, double space, 12 Times Romans

For the final project, students will create a workshop, seminar, or podcast/video on a topic of their choice. Their project must reflect the materials covered in the course that will encourage healing and helpful conversations about sex, sexuality, and sexual violence in their context. Questions to consider:

- 1) Who is your audience?
- 2) Why did you choose this topic?
- 3) Why did you choose this medium?
- 4) What did you learn from this process?
