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Catalog Description

A survey of the essentials of biblical Greek. The focus is on basic grammar, vocabulary, and the development of readings skills. (3 semester units). No perquisites to the course.

Prerequisites

<u>None</u>. Undergrads should, however, talk with their advisors if they want to Greek 1-2 to fulfill a foreign language requirement.

Student Learning Objectives

- 1. By the end of the course, the student will be identifying all Greek letters of the alphabet, syllables, and punctuation marks and pronounce Greek words in sentences out loud with a minimum of 70% accuracy
- 2. By the end of the course, the student will be able to translate 250 Greek vocabulary words into English with a minimum of 70% accuracy
- 3. By the end of the course, the student will be able to parse the morphological forms of the Greek nouns, pronouns, prepositions, conjunctions, adverbs, and select verb tenses (the present, future and imperfect) and translate them into English with a minimum of 70% accuracy
- 4. By the end of the course, the student will be able to translate select Greek passages from the New Testament and translate them into English with a minimum of 70% accuracy

1. Weekly Homework

Learning a language requires daily study and review. It is very important *not* to fall behind in your reading or your homework/assignments. You are expected to have assigned materials prepared prior to the beginning of the class.

Each chapter in the textbook by Mounce has a corresponding exercise in the workbook. Please complete all assignments in the workbook and hand them in, unless otherwise announced. We will be following a modified version of Track #1 of Mounce's lesson plan so that only the regular verbs are introduced first and contract/liquid future/irregular verbs are brought in later in the course. What this will mean is that you can follow Mounce's track#1 for most of the Fall semester until the last remaining weeks. During the last few weeks of the fall (shaded in grey in your schedule) and at the beginning of the Spring

semester (also shaded in grey), **you will have to follow the class schedule in the syllabus closely** as we will modify Mounce's Track #1.

When you submit your homework (HW), please upload your HW through the Assignment Gate provided in each Module. I ask that you please use a decent quality scanner. Please do <u>not</u> take a cell phone photo as these are often blurry and hard to read. Submit the HW as a PDF file (there are many free PDF programs). A PDF file will allow me to use a tablet/computer to hand-write or type comments.

The 3 lowest or missed homework assignments will be dropped (13 - 3 drops = 10 X 10 pts = 100 pts). **10% of your final grade**

2. Tutorial Sessions

You will meet each week for a tutorial/discussion session with the instructor of the course:

- Thursday evenings 5:45-7:15pm central time and weekly asynchronous lectures (synchronous sessions with on campus students and live, online students)
- **Zoom** tutorial meetings at TBD

Tardies or early departures from the session will be deducted points. More details to come and posted on Canvas (13 - 3 drops = 10 sessions X 5pts each = 50 pts total). **5% of your final grade**

3. Weekly Quizzes

We will have a quiz every week with very few exceptions. The quiz will cover vocabulary, paradigms, parsing, and translations. **All** students (campus and online) will take the **quiz online** through canvas.

The 3 lowest or missed quizzes will be dropped (12 - 3 drops = 9 quizzes X 30 pts each = 270 pts total). **27% of your final grade**

4. Audio / Video Uploads

At the beginning of the course, there are 2 select audio/video assignments to help with your pronunciation of Greek. These will be explained on canvas. There are only 3 such assignments (record alphabet song; recite 1 John).

5. *Two Exams* (= 1 Midterm + 1 Final Exam)

We will have one midterm and a final exam. Greek grammar by nature is accumulative, and so the midterm and final exam will cover all material from day 1 up until the time of the exam. However, there will be an emphasis on new material introduced since the previous exam. (200pts for the midterm plus 380pts for the final exam = 580pts total). **58% of your final grade**

Make-up work

Because of the accumulative nature of a Greek course and the expectation that all students complete each module with the prescribed due date, **homework assignments turned in late will not be accepted**. **There are <u>no</u>** *make-up* **quizzes or exams** (and **there are <u>no</u>** *early* **quizzes or exams**) barring extreme circumstances (see the North Park University/Seminary Student Handbook for what constitutes "extreme circumstances;" e.g., severe illness, death in the family, etc.). In the case of severe illness, a physician's note must be given to make-up a missed quiz/exam. *That means, if you simply have a cold*,

please take the missed quiz/assignment as one of your drop's. Any make-up exams must be taken within one week of the student's return to class.

Feedback and Correspondence with the Instructor

The instructor will respond to emails within 24 hours, but weekend emails may not receive a reply until Monday morning. Homework / quizzes are graded within a week before the next module ends. E.g., Module 1 homework / quiz will be graded before Module 2 ends (preferably by Friday, latest Monday).

You need to earn a minimum grade of C-(700 pts) to pass the course. This scale is absolute. On a rare occasion, the above scale may be curved at a later point, but only if the overall class grades are too low, but it is up to the instructor of the course to decide if the final grades should be curved up or not.

For seminarians (<u>not</u> undergrads): Greek I and II is automatically taken on a PASS/NOT PASS basis. There is no reason to take the class for a letter grade unless you are thinking of further graduate work and are confident that you can receive an A grade in the course. If you want to take the class for a letter grade, please see the instructor. You will have to fill out a petition and receive instructor approval. This policy is only for seminarians. Undergraduates should take Greek for a letter grade, especially if Greek fulfills a language requirement.

Academic Honesty
